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O'ahu storm water utility study begins

HONOLULU — The City and County of Honolulu (City) is studying the formation of a storm water utility for O'ahu. The storm water utility will create a dedicated fee for cleaner water and a healthier ocean environment, based on an equitable fee structure.

The City is soliciting input on the fee structure, credits, and program priorities for a storm water utility. As part of a robust public involvement program, the first round of community meetings begins on February 3rd. Go to <u>www.StormWaterUtilityOahu.org</u> for the schedule. A Stakeholder Advisory Group has also been convened.

Rain — millions of gallons — flushes down rooftops, streets and other hard surfaces collecting dirt, debris, trash, and more pollutants along the way. Then, as storm water, it makes its way into ditches, drains, and canals that flow into streams and the ocean. Our island and ocean environments are degraded by the pollutants in the storm water.

Additionally, urbanization and an increase of hard surfaces that don't absorb water means much of this water runs off the mountains and land, rather than percolating back into the soil, robbing our island's groundwater supply of replenishment. This excess runoff can create localized drainage flooding issues.

In 2015, recognizing that *"If Hawaii does not begin planning ahead, ensuring the islands' supply of fresh water in the future may cost the public a great deal…"* Hawaii's State Legislature adopted a bill that allows counties to set up storm water utilities.

Storm water utilities provide municipalities with dedicated, fee-based funding available exclusively for storm water management purposes. Already in the United States, there are more than 2,000 storm water utilities across 39 states. The City Department of Facility Maintenance is overseeing this process.
